A MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER

An out-of-towner drove his car into a ditch in a desolated area. Luckily, a local farmer came to help with his big strong horse named Buddy. He hitched Buddy up to the car and yelled, "Pull, Nellie, pull!" Buddy didn't move. Then the farmer hollered, "Pull, Buster, pull!" Buddy didn't respond. Once more the farmer commanded, "Pull, Coco, pull!" Nothing. Then the farmer nonchalantly said, "Pull, Buddy, pull!" And the horse easily dragged the car out of the ditch. The motorist was most appreciative



and very curious. He asked the farmer why he called his horse by the wrong name three times. The farmer said, "Oh, Buddy is blind and if he thought he was the only one pulling, he wouldn't even try!"

Why are we sometimes hesitant to even try if we think we are the only one pulling? Such an attitude can cause us to ignore promptings of the Holy Spirit. If we think of something we can do in the church or the community and tell ourselves that nobody else will support it, before we even explored the idea, we might miss an excellent opportunity to express our faith, make a difference and contribute to the Kingdom. God is at work in all our communities. Do we notice it? Do we ask ourselves how we can get involved with what God is up to where we live, work, play or learn?

God's overwhelming love for the world brought him to the point where He gave his Son so that everyone who believes in Him will have life. (John 3:16) In 1 Timothy 2:1-4 we are urged to pray for all people. To ask God to help them; to intercede on their behalf, and to give thanks for them. "This is good and pleases God our Saviour, who wants everyone to be saved and to understand the truth." (1 Tim 2:4) Jesus is sending us as the Father sent Him. (John 20:21) So, let us be sensitive to the promptings of the Holy Spirit. Let us not resist or hesitate the next time God asks us to pull. Let us not wonder if there are others or wait for others. Let us not



make excuses. Let us not suffer from doubt. God never asks more of us than we are capable of. God wants to bring new life into our communities and people around us as God has given us new life. God is using you and will continue to reach out through you to build the Kingdom.

Please talk to me about what God is doing in and through you. If the opportunity God showed you is a more than one person job, maybe others can join you in working out God's will.

There are many people around us who feel they are stuck in a ditch. Pull them out in the name of God – commissioned by Jesus Christ and guided by the Holy Spirit.

Intern report

Greetings, grace, and peace to you all in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Firstly, let me once again thank you for the privilege of embarking on my internship placement amongst you here at St Enoch's Presbyterian Church. For those of you who may not have been aware; very late last year, my family and I were preparing to shift our lives to



either New Plymouth or Dunedin. We are thankful that God had other plans for us, which did not involve uprooting us from the beautiful Bay of Plenty once St Enoch's opened her doors. You have all been extremely welcoming and embracing of my whole family and it has been a real pleasure being able to serve God here with you. To the Session, Board of Managers, and especially Rev Dr Jaco Reyneke, thank you for your openness and your hearts to serve the church by taking on my internship placement.

It is quite amazing to me that it has been almost 7 months since my internship officially started. For me, it seems that so much has happened in such a brief time as I am now already more than a quarter way through the internship. This is due I suppose to the interwoven nature of my commitments to both KCML (Knox Centre for Ministry and Leadership) and St Enoch's, let alone my commitments as a husband and father. As you know, Knox requires me to be away in the deep south for a few weeks each year and my last block course is coming up next month. These are times of great theological discussion and reflection

where my fellow interns and I, can explore with the KCML Faculty, our experiences and the current challenges facing the church today.



There are a number of areas that, in discussion with Jaco and my wider support network, I have looked to concentrate on in this internship. Firstly, is leading in various ministry environments which might involve small groups, gatherings, meetings as well as preparing, organising, and leading the Sunday worship service.

Jaco has given me many opportunities to lead services, communions, and meetings. He has also given me freedom to take the initiative with various small groups as well as having responsibility for a monthly worship service at Radius Althorp rest home in Pyes Pa. It is also a pleasure to express worship through music with fellow music lovers in a small Thursday gathering. This group played together at the most recent Radius Althorp service which is a step toward a practical way to minister to the wider community with their talents. As part of my KCML requirements, I am leading a spiritual discernment group (a listening group). This is a 2–3-month exercise, where we hope to discern what God might be specifically calling St Enoch's to, as well as strengthening our sense of mission. Additionally, I will be starting a 'homegroup' during the day to see if there is need for a midweek time of fellowship. I'm excited to see what comes of these various gatherings.

Another area that I wanted to concentrate on is in the wider governance of the Presbyterian church. As such, I have made a point to ensure that I am present at all Session and Board of Managers meetings, Presbytery meetings and gatherings (including ordinations, minister's luncheons, theological reflection, and training days...etc). There have also been opportunities that I have taken to speak and preach at various

places within the margins of our church. A couple of weeks after returning from



Dunedin in Sept, I will also be attending General Assembly as part of the internship.

A third area of emphasis which I feel a general affinity



with, is in Discipleship, Mission and Pastoral Care. These are areas where I have been able to immerse myself within the life and lives of this body of believers. Visiting pastorally, getting to know you the parish, doing my best to be present and available to you all (there's been a lot of coffees!). Of note is being able to visit those who are not always able to come to our church gatherings and worship services, and there have been opportunities to have communion with many of you in your homes. It is also an area where I have taken steps to engage in the wider community through the various networks that we have developed during our few years in Tauranga. This being said, these encounters, meetings and visits have been such a blessing to me personally, so thank you all for being open to having time with me.

Lastly, I have been intentional about ensuring my life rhythms remain balanced and conducive to maintaining my well-being for ministry. These are my spiritual, mental, physical, and family rhythms. As the life of ministry can be excessively demanding on all four of these life rhythms, it is an area that KCML and the wider church hope that we are strict on maintaining. To be able to serve God to the best of our ability, it is important that we keep these rhythms well-maintained and in check. To this end, let us all keep each other in prayer as we all need to be mindful of self-care.

The start of my internship would not have been such a blessing, or as enjoyable, were it not for the supporting cast. First and foremost, God who is sovereign, gracious, and forgiving; my wife and family who are so supportive; the Ministry Reflection Group who volunteer their time to discuss and reflect with me on my ministry. My various supervisors, at KCML and from the Kaimai Presbytery; my mentoring minister Jaco who has been so encouraging and open to allow me freedom to explore ministry and service to God; the leadership and you, the wider body of St Enoch's.

As I look ahead to the latter half of the year, there is much on the cards it seems. Mostly from the KCML side in the next few months, but then practically with St Enoch's. It is exciting to see how the Spirit moves in and amongst you and what God might have in store for you. Let us be vigilant together in ensuring that Jaco and the wider St Enoch's leadership is lifted in prayer and cared for as they continue to lead, serve, and minister.

The actual figures are compared with the budget.

It will be seen from the statement, when compared with the budget, the Church is well ahead in Income due to the Intern sponsorship donations \$10,200 and additional revenue received from property rental.



As reported in the previous Manawa the expenses

are above budget by \$10,436 mainly due to the intern cost and the additional cost of building maintenance of painting the kitchen, lounge, entrance, and office.

This all combines to give an excellent result for the year a profit of \$8,993.

My Mom waited, and sure enough, I walked down the hall with a cup of tea for Daddy and she watched him drink it up.


Then she says, (as only a mother would know...) 'Did it ever occur to you that the only place that your daughter can reach to get water is the toilet?'



Life's Choices

Just for the record I am an English lass – born in UK not SA ☺

As a teenager I hated the English winters and dreamed of living overseas in the sun..... Then fate intervened!

I was a child bride when I arrived in NZ in 1974. Life was exciting – A new land full of opportunity – New beginnings – A place to build a beautiful home and raise a family, weekends full of Sea /Sun and Fun.



I was homesick and missed my family however felt fortunate to be in Aotearoa and benefit from all she had to offer!

We would travel regularly visiting home in the UK arranging family reunion and holidays, catching up with loved ones, storing away moments and precious memories, to forge me on for the next family get together. It was one Christmas holiday while visiting that I was given the news Mum was sick. We spent our 4 week enjoying the festive season then came back home to continue our normal life of days filled with work, kids school and weekend sports.

My mum was 59 that January – she passed away February 24th after having a short terrible battle with cancer (5 months in all). I was home again for her funeral the following day.

My father in his grief and frustration told me I had broken Mum's heart by choosing to leave and live in NZ.

That was one very hard day to endure.

I believe a mother and daughters love cannot be broken by distance or time. The bond lives on internally – love stored deep in your soul. On quiet still days the pain emerges, and I reflect on the past – turning pages of my memories – bringing a smile to my face. Talking to others in our church family I find myself sharing an understanding. Those of us who have chosen a New Land a place to call home share a bittersweet existence. The joy of providing a new beautiful rich lifestyle for family and loved ones – balanced out with the pain, guilt and heartbreak for the missing loved ones that we left behind. Share a Cup of Tea with Chrissy


If you are a senior and feeling lonely, you are not alone. Many seniors feel lonely, without the support of family (who may have moved away) and friends.

Mission Aviation Fellowship

MAF has purchased a hangar at Tauranga Airport, as well as office space and accommodation. The plan is to developed it into the Kendon-Strong MAF Centre! This Centre will



allow MAF to recruit and develop missionary pilots, engineers, ground staff, managers and leaders. It will be a "hub" of MAF activity—prayer, fundraising for the work overseas, recruitment, equipping of new staff, training and connecting with others in the aviation industry. They currently are starting to develop the space to bring the dream into reality.

The Centre will enable MAF to connect with upcoming generations of young people to be inspired by the vision of missions and aviation. Schools will be able to bring their classes for a "MAF experience". All kinds of visual and digital media will be used to tell the history of MAF and share stories in an interactive and engaging way. The Cessna 206 will allow visitors to sit in and experience an operational plane that flew for MAF for 30 years.

MAF will be having an official opening in October (more details to follow) and this will be an opportunity for churches and donors to come and visit the Centre and find out more.

Wycliff Bible Translators NZ

Kevin and Jillian Connole from Wycliff will be in Tauranga on Sunday November 7th, and plan to visit St Enoch's that day and tell us more about their work at Wycliff.



In their newsletter, Kevin and Jillian ask for prayer for the health and wellbeing of their colleagues in East Africa. When reading the Connole's newsletter one again realises in what a unique situation we are here in New Zealand to be Covid free. Apparently the COVID situation in Tanzania has become much worse. The newly translated Simbiti New Testaments arrived in Dar es Salaam and are on their way to Musoma, in northwest Tanzania. A dedicated celebration of the Bibles is planned for the 21st of August but due to the covid situation in Tanzania there is currently some doubt as to whether the planned Simbiti New Testaments launch will be able to take place in August as planned. Prayer is needed for:

- The Simbiti people as they plan to celebrate the dedication of the New Testament.
- The health and wellbeing of the Wycliff employees and colleagues in East Africa.

Biggest news this year from Homes of Hope was the opening of their 4th home, which the children have named Kauri. There is still a need for kitchen, laundry and bathroom appliances, as well as

Molly tell about her work visiting patients in hospital and offering them support. Molly told of patients that are often lonely during their hospital stay and who appreciates a visit and to see a friendly face.

Training to become a volunteer chaplain assistant will commence later in the year. Additional chaplain volunteers will supplement their team and provide more support especially to the mental health patients. Prayer is always appreciated as they seek God's best person for the team.

St Enoch's sends a team of six volunteers to assist in taking patients from the wards to the Church service in the Tauranga Hospital chapel which is held every Sunday morning at 10:30. The volunteers meet in the chapel and after a communal prayer they disperse to the wards and give patients the opportunity to attend the service and worship. St Enoch's volunteers serve approximately every two months and will again be heling at the Hospital chapel in September. Anyone who is interested in serving in this

way by escorting patients to the Hospital Chapel can contact the church office and get into contact with Bernice who organises the volunteers.



Book Review:


Is Marriage for Me? a faith journey by June Dooney
