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A MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER

Good News

Jesus Christ declared: "The Spirit of the LORD is upon me, for he has anointed me to bring Good News to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim that captives will be released, that the blind will see, that the oppressed will be set free, and that the time of the LORD's favour has come." (Luke 4:18-19; NLT)



Bringing the Good news did not end there. Jesus prayed: "Just as you sent me into the world, I am

sending them into the world." (John 17:18) And the apostle Paul reminds us: "And all of this is a gift from God, who brought us back to himself through Christ. And God has given us this task of reconciling people to him. For God was in Christ, reconciling the world to himself, no longer counting people's sins against them. And he gave us this wonderful message of reconciliation. So, we are Christ's ambassadors; God is making his appeal through us. We speak for Christ when we plead, "Come back to God!" (2 Corinthians 5:18-20; NLT)

"Our task as ambassadors of this gospel is to formulate it in a manner that speaks to the minds and hearts of those to whom we address ourselves – or at least does not get in the way of their hearing."

Within the context of globalism and the various paradigms simultaneously at play in our context, we shall have to sincerely and compassionately attempt to understand how people see and understand the world. Without truly knowing people's perspective on life, it will be impossible to formulate our witness in a way that will be heard and lead to curiosity, enthusiasm, and through the Holy Spirit eventually also to faith.

Our natural tendency is to contradict, resist and try to correct the way people see and understand the world if it is different from our worldview. We want them to either have a similar worldview to us or at least something like the worldview that was dominant in the good old days. This causes us to come across as condescending, and even judgemental. It also creates the impression that we are not truly willing to

listen and try and understand where the younger generations are coming from.

Many people today are anxious and overwhelmed. People seem disconnected, isolated, and lonely. And people is looking for purpose in life. God's God News in Jesus Christ addresses our deepest needs to enable our relationship with God to be restored.

Perhaps, Jesus' words relayed in Luke 4:18 and 19 today would have been: "The Spirit of the LORD is upon me, for he has anointed me to bring Good News to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim that anxious and overwhelmed people will find purpose, that the disconnected will be meaningfully incorporated in loving caring community, that those in search of who they are will be accepted, and that the time of the LORD's favour has come."

We need to continuously look for ways to effectively share the Good News with people. Jesus shared the good news with everybody. Jesus engaged with leaders and upstanding members of the community. Jesus sat with people looked down on by society. Jesus associated with people who were rejected and despised by society. Jesus ate with people who were considered not to be good company. Jesus' opponents even called Him a glutton and a drunkard (Luke 7:34).

Over summer and the Christmas period we need to

- nurture our faith in Jesus Christ and grow our relationship with God,
- ensure our opinions and interactions with people are driven and motivated by the love of the crucified and risen Christ,
- do our best to understand people's needs,
- help anxious and overwhelmed people to find purpose,
- help the disconnected to be meaningfully incorporated in a loving caring community,
- help those in search of who they are to be accepted,
- and we need to embody the fact that the LORD's favour has come.


In Jesus Christ is acceptance, community and purpose. As recipients of God's love, we need to bring this good news to others.



Also inserted are the Giving income the YTD figure for 2022, 2021 and 2020 years.

In comparing the actual to the budget figures, there appears to be a shift away from giving by Automatic Payments. This has resulted in a gradual decline in total giving income.

While the income is below budget, there has been a corresponding drop in expenditure. It has resulted in a profit of \$12,660. This is misleading as the full cost of this years, insurance has yet to register. Even though St Enoch's has paid the full Insurance premium the cost is spread over the year. The best way to compare is with the Bank account balances as at 31 October 2023 had funds of \$59,418 whereas in the 2022 year had registered funds of \$64,121. A difference of \$4,703.

Just another reminder, if you are contributing to the church in cash or using the envelope system, please consider paying your offering each month via an Automatic Payment. This helps the church in the administration of handling cash and banking.

As with the envelope system please ensure you add a number to your initialled surname.

This helps to collate your giving to a total for your end of year tax refund of 30%, and ensures your contributions are confidential

Spiritual Growth Group




That is the core of spiritual growth. Finding ways, habits and practices which help us strengthen our relationship with God and more clearly express our love for God and people through everyday living.

LOIS ROUT 5.10.36 - 26.10.23


We are saddened to announce the passing of Lois Rout, a dear member of our church.



Thank you to Jaco and Anel for taking us on an adventure with photos and tales about their amazing trip around Southern Africa – 10,900 km of driving and 3,501 km domestic flying.

What a lovely night we all had, and we all got spoilt with local Afrikaans cuisine that Jaco and Anel prepared and served to us. What a fantastic night and they raised \$1400 for St Enochs – thank you so much.

Check out the recipes for the pumpkin fritters and Malva pudding below that Anel shared with us. They were both delicious and commonly eaten in South Africa in the Afrikaans speaking community.



















Pumpkin fritters

- 1 cup pumpkin cooked and pureed
- 1 cup flour (I used gluten free flour)
- 2 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 tablespoon caster sugar
- 1 egg
- ¼ cup milk
- · pinch of salt
- oil for deep frying
- 1. Combine all the ingredients and mix until you have a smooth batter.
- 2. Heat the oil in a medium saucepan and fry spoonful's of the batter until golden brown and cooked throughout, approximately 2-3 minutes.
- 3. Remove from the oil and allow to drain on kitchen paper.
- 4. Continue until all the fritters are cooked.

Malva pudding

- 15ml butter
- 125ml sugar
- 1 egg
- 250ml flour,
- 125ml milk
- 30ml apricot jam,
- 5ml baking soda
- 15ml vinegar



- 1. Cream butter, sugar and egg.
- 2. Add milk and flour bit by bit, mix well. Combine apricot jam, baking soda and vinegar- stir into the mixture.
- 3. Bake @ 180°C approximately 30min. When you remove from oven, immediately pour the hot (not boiling) sauce carefully over the pudding.

Sauce:

250ml cream, 125ml sugar (I use less), 50ml water, 5ml vanilla essence

We are a small group and we are enthusiastic about what we read. So others can become interested in different books we like to share and lend what we are currently reading.




The genre is varied as books from the public and church libraries are shared.




A karakia is usually said before the meal and St Enoch's is always mentioned and thanked for the contribution.

A BOQUET OF BEATITUDES

Beatitudes are found in Matthew's Gospel, chapter 5 at the beginning of the Sermon on the Mount. Perhaps you know them or learnt them in Sunday School – all nine of them – as guidelines for your Christian living.



But wait, there is more! There are quite a few tucked in the Book of Psalms – about a dozen and here are some for YOU.

Psalm 32: 1+2 "Blessed is the person whose transgressions are forgiven, whose sins are covered"

"Blessed is the person whose sin the Lord does not count against that person and in whose spirit is no deceit."

Psalm 34:8 "Taste and see that the Lord is good, blessed is the person who takes refuge in Him:"

Psalm 40:4 "Blessed is the person who makes the Lord his trust, who does not look to the proud, to those who turn aside to false Gods"

Psalm 84: 4+5 "Blessed are those who dwell in your house O Lord they are ever praising you"

"Blessed are those whose strength is in You"

"Blessed are all who respect and revere the Lord, who walk in His ways"

Psalm 128: 1 "Blessed are all who respect and revere the Lord who walk in His ways"

I draw your attention to the above as good words and messages to ponder and meditate on and to add to the Beatitudes in Matthew 5 for living a fully rounded, rich Christian life shaped by these gracious, promised blessings of our loving Heavenly Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

NB Some modern translations have "Happy" instead of blessed. But I think happy is a thin word made so by frequent and overuse. "blessed" to me strongly suggests something God is doing as it brings Him into the equation as some would say.

God is the Blessed One. He blesses us all.
