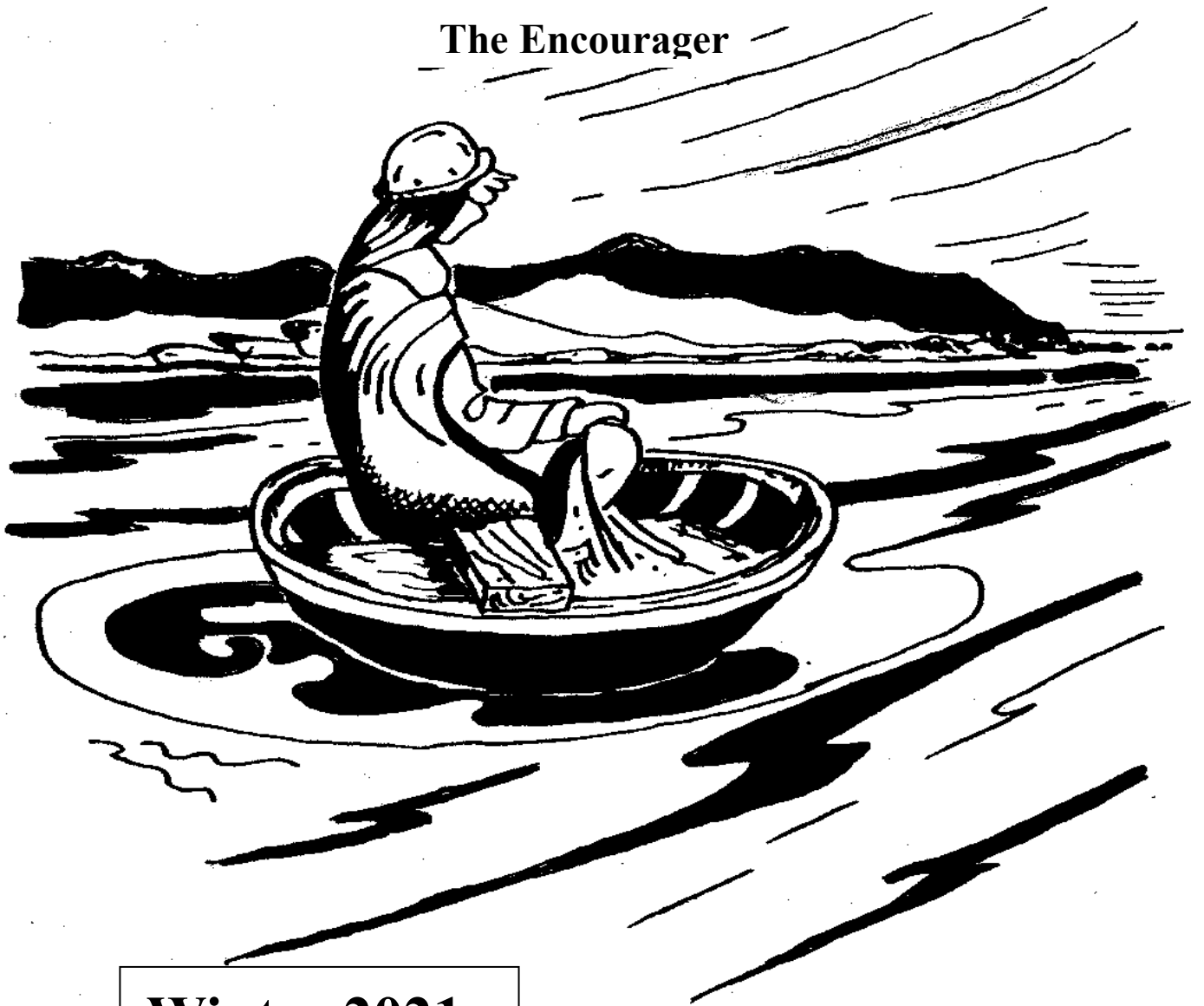

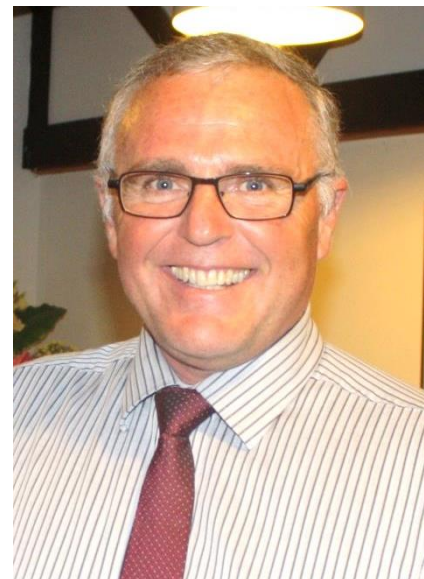

A MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER

St. Enoch's is God's church here in Tauranga south. On the 2nd of May we celebrated 70 years of grace. As we look back over the past 70 years and give thanks for God's guidance and grace. We also acknowledge the faithful service of many who has gone before us.



In 1939 God called Mr and Mrs Davies to start a Sunday school in this area. More and more children came to the Sunday School. God then used people from St. Peter's to build a hall for the Sunday School to meet in. This is the same hall that is at the back of the church and was restored a number of years ago.

In 1942 the first services were held here. God was planting a church here. The people God used obeyed God's instructions. Many people worked hard. They gave their skills, time and money and used it in God's service. On 2 May 1951 St. Enoch's was officially established as a church.

God worked in the church. People came to faith here. Many people's faith was nurtured and grew stronger here. God worked through the church in the community. Many people share stories of how they came to Sunday School in the hall, how they got married here, were baptised here, were helped and supported by the church and her people.

The past more than 70 years God used different people in different ways here at St. Enoch's. 1 Corinthians 12 teaches that the Body of Jesus Christ (the church) is made up of many different parts with different roles. The one is not more important than the other and the one should not aspire to be the other. "... our bodies have many parts, and God has put each part just where he wants it." (verse 18). "So, God has put the body together such that extra honour and care are given to those parts that have less dignity. This makes for harmony

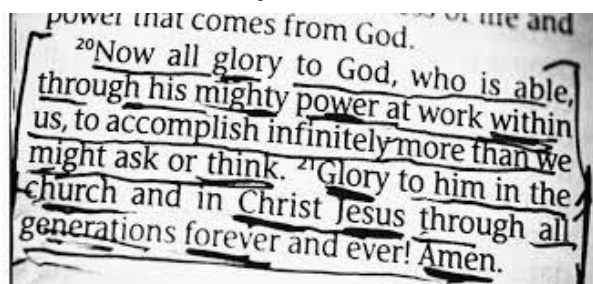
among the members, so that all the members care for each other. If one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it, and if one part is honoured, all the parts are glad. All of you together are Christ's body, and each of you is a part of it." (1 Cor 12:24-27)

We are part of the Body of Christ. We are the St. Enoch's faith family. First and foremost, we are God's people. We are brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ. God has called us together. We are from different backgrounds, from different countries, with different personalities, with different cultures, of different ages and facing different challenges in our lives. Yet we are called to care for each other and share the Good News with others. Jesus said: "So now I am giving you a new commandment: Love each other. Just as I have loved you, you should love each other. Your love for one another will prove to the world that you are my disciples." (Joh 13:34-35)

We need to take our spiritual growth seriously. "This will continue until we all come to such unity in our faith and knowledge of God's Son that we will be mature in the Lord, measuring up to the full and complete standard of Christ." (Ephesians 4:13) People of St. Enoch's, "since God chose you to be the holy people he loves, you must clothe yourselves with tender-hearted mercy, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience." (Colossians 3:12) "Share each other's burdens, and in this way obey the law of Christ." (Galatians 6:2) "Let us think of ways to motivate one another to acts of love and good works. And let us not neglect our meeting together, as some people do, but encourage one another, especially now that the day of his return is drawing near." (Hebrews 10:24-25)

We can confidently look to the future. "... all glory to God, who is able, through his mighty power at work within us, to accomplish infinitely more than we might ask or think. Glory to him in the church and in Christ Jesus through all generations forever and ever! Amen." (Ephesians 3:20-21)

During the past months the St Enoch's faith family have continued to actively engage in helping those in less fortunate circumstances. The Homes of Hope, The Mission Aviation Fellowship, The Tauranga Hospital Chaplaincy and Wycliffe Bible Translators have all be receiving their usual annual amounts

which is evidence that despite our human system being under some pressure, our God will continue to provide for His people.

The parish is in the process of doing its Re-View. You may be familiar with the quinquennial visitation that PCANZ used to conduct. This is similar but much more focused on the future than the past. A questionnaire was available to which there were over 50 respondents. There was a meeting here in May where the wider leadership gathered with the Kaimai Presbytery facilitators to discuss the findings. The conclusions will be communicated to you as soon as they are available.

Your Session is delighted to welcome back Minette. Her adventures didn't last as long as she originally thought they would. She missed us too much!

It goes without saying, there is no 'i' in team. Here at St Enoch's we can give thanks to our God that there is a strong, faithful team working for the Kingdom. Especially Jaco and Marie. They keep the wheels of our family turning with a happy smile, no matter what the challenges.

Intern report

The April / May period has been for me, what I can only describe as a serene flurry. That is to say that although it has been quite full of activity, it has not been overly taxing, physically, mentally, or spiritually, to be frank, it has been a period of spiritual invigoration for me.

Closer to home, I have had some great interactions with various parishioners during pastoral visits and home communions. For my KCML requirements, we have a few online workshops with a number of assignments ticking over which keeps the lulls in the days full but enriching.

This month with Jaco away, will present another opportunity to build my ministry experience, I appreciate the confidence from Jaco and the wider eldership team to lead for the next 3 weeks (don't worry, I'm sure Jaco will have his phone on!). It was a

great pleasure to see and experience the rich history of St Enoch's with the 70th Celebration and it was also a privilege to be able to take my first communion service with you (although there was a little bit of pressure with the number of ministers present). Also, I took our first service with Radius Althorp in Pyes Pa, and St Enoch's will lead this service on the first Wed of each month at 11am, please contact me if you are free to sing and minister on these days, it is an enriching time to be the hands and feet of Christ.



We are looking at restarting a homegroup/s and have had several generous offers of support. We are looking at how best to implement this and are hoping to have something solid in the next few weeks. St. Enoch's Presbyterian Church Mission Plan

As part of the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand we affirm that we are called to work with others to make Jesus Christ known through the five faces of mission:

- † Through proclamation of the gospel
- † Through the nurture and teaching of people in the Christian faith
- † Through response to human need in loving service
- † Through seeking to transform society
- † Through care for creation

Context

The Tauranga South Community

The local community context presents what seems to be a fairly static population base over the last 15 or so years (6,888 in 2018).

When looking at the makeup of this base, we find that it can be predominantly characterized as middle-aged (44.1% between 30 and 64), employed, Europeans (74.7%). The statistics indicate a fairly slow population increase, this could be due to an established infrastructure without any real large trend toward subdivisions or larger development at this stage. 60% of the population are employed full or part-time and 3.9% are unemployed. 48% do not own their own home. Of note is that 24.7% of the population were born overseas.

Worth noting are the large numbers of rest homes (10), mental health housing (4), schools (7), and churches (12) within a 5km radius of St Enoch's.

There are also some obvious trends that need to be considered as we discern God's mission for us:

- There is a trend where a higher number of people are obtaining undergraduate and postgraduate qualifications. Whatever the reasons for this, it might bring a different dimension to how we might communicate and engage with this growing segment.

- There is a steady increase in Pasifika peoples (doubled to 3%) and Asian peoples (tripled to 14.6%) into this area. How are we placed missionally to engage these groups now and in the future if this rate of increase continues over the next decade or so?
- The Maori population make up 16.9% of the total however their growth is slower but steady. As Presbyterians who are formally 'Bi-cultural,' how does this data fit into our mission plan?
- There is a strong and steady increase of those who identify as a 'none.' No religious affiliation (43.7%)
- There is a strong and steady decline of those who identify as Christian (currently 39.7%).

Worship

A variety of people are part of the St. Enoch's faith family. We are a multicultural and intergenerational church. Although our age distribution is skewed, we do have a few younger families and an active Sunday School.

A disproportionately high number of people struggling with mental health attend and are part of St. Enoch's.

To engage with younger generations, we use a variety of music (including digital music), include children in the service and nurture an intergenerational appreciation and respect.

Focal Point: Looking for ways to incorporate multiculturalism and multilingualism in worship. We are to plan an International Sunday before the end of the year.

Mission

Everything we do have a missional intention.

The past two years we have successfully focussed on friendship and social evangelism. Various social activities are held to which people outside of the congregation are invited.

We support two local (Homes of Hope; Hospital Chaplaincy) and two international organisations (Mission Aviation Fellowship; Wycliffe Bible Translators) financially and with prayer support.

A Mission Motivator facilitates and build our relationships with the four partners.

Focal Point: Explore ways to encourage and nurture people to be effective evangelists.

Spiritual Growth

There are various opportunities (STEW; Spiritual Growth Group; Bible Reading Programs; once off study series) for members to grow in their faith and expression of their faith. It will be great if we could get some home groups going.

We have a dedicated Sunday School team nurturing children's faith.

We have a pre-service prayer group, an after-service prayer station and a prayer chain, in addition to the corporate prayers during service and regular calls to all members to pray for certain topics.

The Men's and Ladies' coffee groups on a Tuesday and Have-A-Go on a Wednesday fulfil an important role in many people's lives.

Focal Point: To encourage Biblical literacy by running a winter Bible reading program.

Resource Planning

We continuously are on the lookout for people with the appropriate attributes to be called and ordained as elders. We also nurture people to grow in their faith and towards leadership in the church.

We are committed to provide an internship placement for the next two years.

At St. Enoch's we strive to provide a safe space for people to grow their gifts, gain confidence and find ways in which to serve the Kingdom with their gifts.

A dedicated team of two keep the library relevant and provide good study and reading material to the congregation.

Focal Point: To explore ways in which our website and social media can be used more effectively to reach out to our community.

Pastoral Care:

It has been a busy time lately for Gail, Robyn Dowdle, Joan and Marie in the office, as they revamped the Pastoral Care lists. There were so many corrections to make. If we have taken someone off your list that you particularly want on, please talk to Marie. However, we have endeavoured to keep deliveries in similar areas to where you live.

We sincerely thank all our deliverers -
You are our special Pastoral Carers.

We thank all who visit people in their homes, care facilities or hospital. We have had a number of people in hospital lately and pray for God to meet them, be their strength and sustainer.

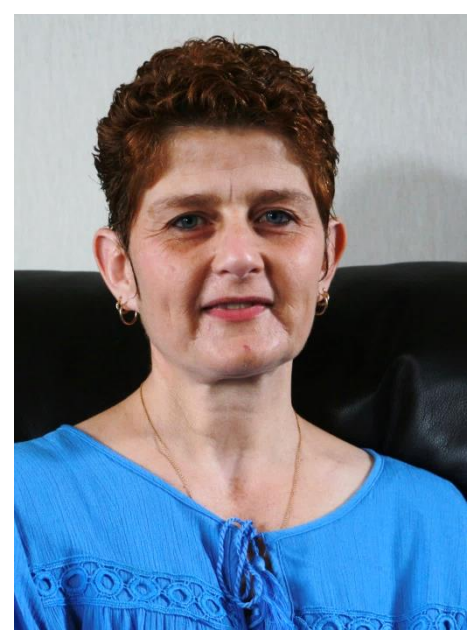

As a continuation from the previous Manawa, included is the summary of St Enoch's Profit and Loss Accounts for the Year-to-Date April 2021.

The actual figures are compared with the budget.

It will be seen from the statement, when compared with the budget, the Church is ahead in giving income and sundry income. Up by \$25,217.



Although the expenses are above budget by \$4,545 the Church has managed an excellent profit of \$10,260.

A pleasing result when it was expected we would be running at a loss of \$10,403.

Tax Donations receipts for the year ended 31 March 2021 have been completed and will be forwarded to you shortly. (By the time, this Manawa has been sent out you should have received your receipt)

Just another reminder, if you are contributing to the church in cash or using the envelope system, please consider paying your offering each month via an Automatic Payment.

If you would like to change to automatic payments, but need assistance please call myself or Marie and we will be happy to assist.

With the Banks phasing out Cheques and trying to reduce the amount of cash that they handle, APs are a good alternative to make a church donation. This will also help in the administration of collating the Tax receipts.

As with the envelope system please ensure you add a number to your initialled surname.

This helps to collate your giving to a total for your end of year tax refund of 30%, and ensures contributions are confidential.

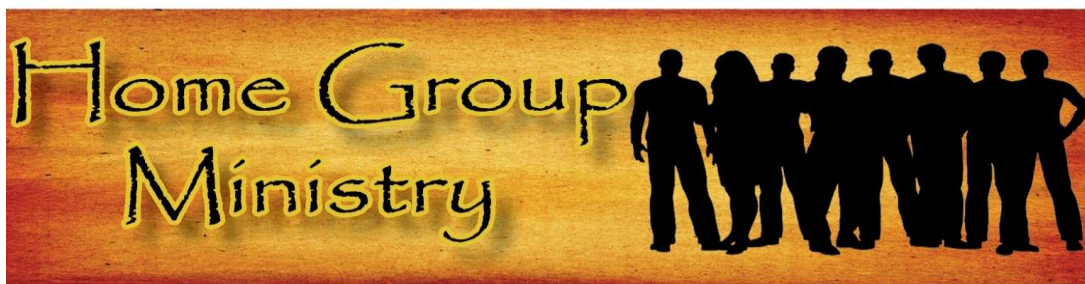

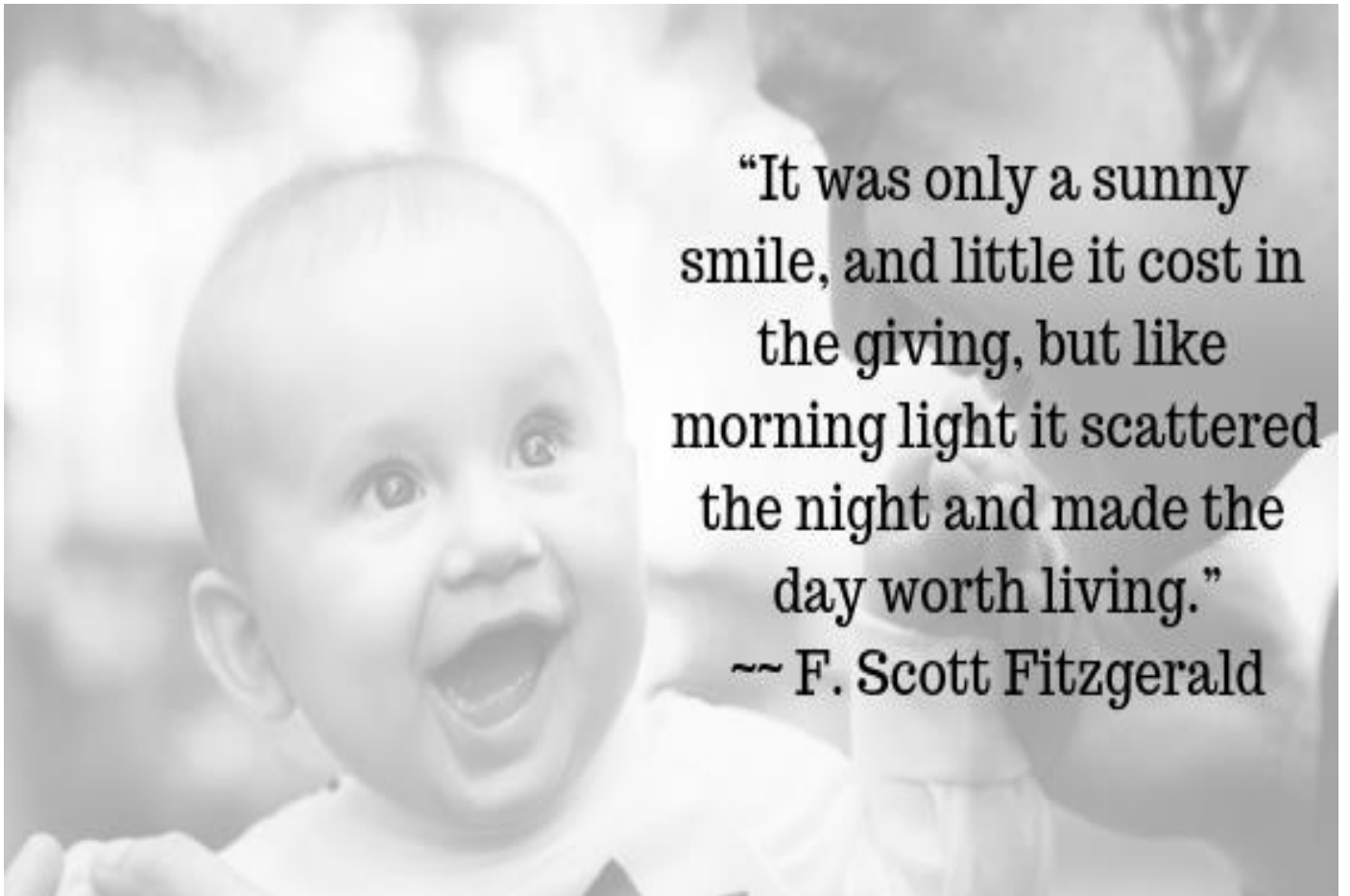
Hospitality Sunday

It was a day in early January I had just started back at work after the Christmas holidays.

I had arranged to get my car serviced at Scofields in Newmarket and my colleague had followed me in her car to bring me back to work. I



I dropped off my keys at reception and walked across the forecourt and from out of nowhere a car reversed and swung wide right into my path.

I was knocked down. The driver stopped when he realized he had hit something and changed into 1st gear. He then pulled forward and run over my leg a second time.

I could not see, only hear - there was many voices, panic. Close to my ear I heard my colleague say "Oh Chrissy your leg"! I spent 5 days in hospital and the surgeon said nothing could be done as the foot was crushed and it had to be set. We had to wait and see.

The month passed in a blur, there were many dark days. My leg needed to stay elevated to reduce the constant pain and I needed to heal, in mind, body and soul. I prayed to be able to walk again... I prayed for peace and happiness and to not be alone.

I had home help from the local church - a man that had recently lost his wife to cancer. He wanted to keep busy, and he cooked and cleaned also did a little shopping for me. It was difficult

having a stranger in my personal space, but I was thankful for the help and a little company.

It was August that year when I got my final plaster removed. My leg was white and frail after months in plaster. I was going to physiotherapy and getting stronger but I was able to walk again with a slight limp!

I was invited to a social gathering arranged for a meet and greet with a mature group of 10x Gents and 9x Ladies. They wanted me to make up the last lady. I was told there was a South African gent also called Chris going to be there. It was Friday late afternoon, and I was getting ready but also having second thoughts about going out as I had lost all my confidence and was nervous about driving again after such a long time. I pulled on a long skirt to cover my leg and set off with my knees shaking.

I found a makeshift car-park downtown and parked. I went over to the pay and display machine, there was a tall man standing in front of me and he asked for help battling to obtain his ticket. Chris and I actually met in the car-park!

We realized after a brief exchange we were going to the same venue and Chris asked if he could walk with me. He started out with his big strides, then noticed I was limping and instantly slowed to shuffle along by my side.

That was over 20 years ago now - Devine Intervention was written over 10 years ago.

My prayers were heard and answered - I thank God and feel blessed every single day.

To our church family I offer a helping hand to those in need - or a friend to share a cuppa Tea!

Mission Aviation Fellowship

A message from Mark Fox,
MAF New Zealand (CEO)



I want to begin by saying “Thank you” to each and every one of you who has “stayed the course” with us through the challenges that we all faced in 2020.

Although we have been truly blessed here in New Zealand and many of us have escaped the worst effects of the virus, it has still been a difficult time for many others. It would have been very easy to become distracted by worries about the pandemic and the future—but in fact the prayers and finances that we rely on have continued. I deeply appreciate the steadfast support we have received.

Update on COVID-19

In our 75 years of serving remote communities in the far corners of the world, we have never seen anything that has so deeply affected the entire world economically and socially as COVID-19. In some countries we have served almost as normal, while in others we have been limited to providing few flights to aid the government in the fight against COVID-19. Our hearts and minds are constantly focused on the isolated people who live in the most remote locations where we serve. Literally tens of thousands have not been served with the basics to address their physical and spiritual needs. As we prepare to once again serve their communities, we anticipate encountering food shortages, unattended medical needs, exacerbated educational challenges and spiritual hunger.

Looking to the future

At the same time, a lot of positive things are happening! A hangar construction project in Liberia is finished. MAFI staff have moved into their new office premises in Cairns. Construction of new aircraft maintenance and administrative facilities in Mareeba have begun. Here in New Zealand, new staff are joining us.

As CEO I know how important it is that we keep moving forward and staying open to new ideas and vision. 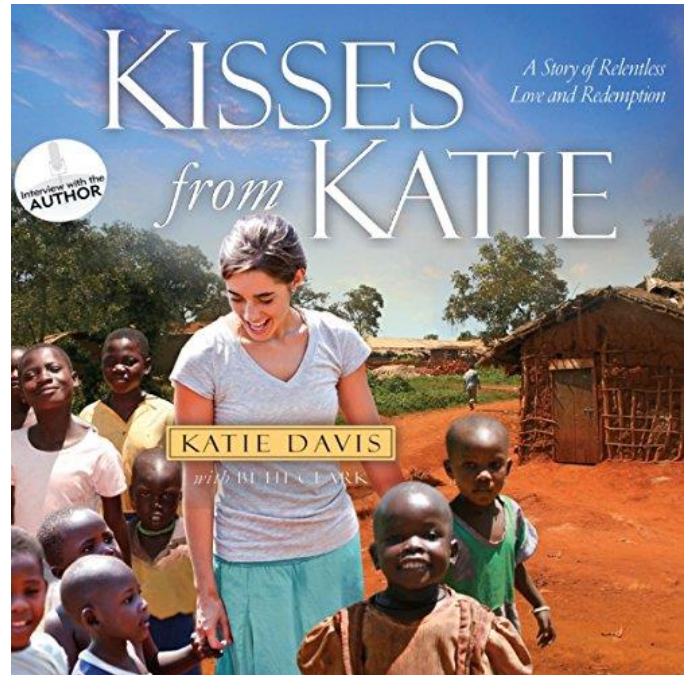

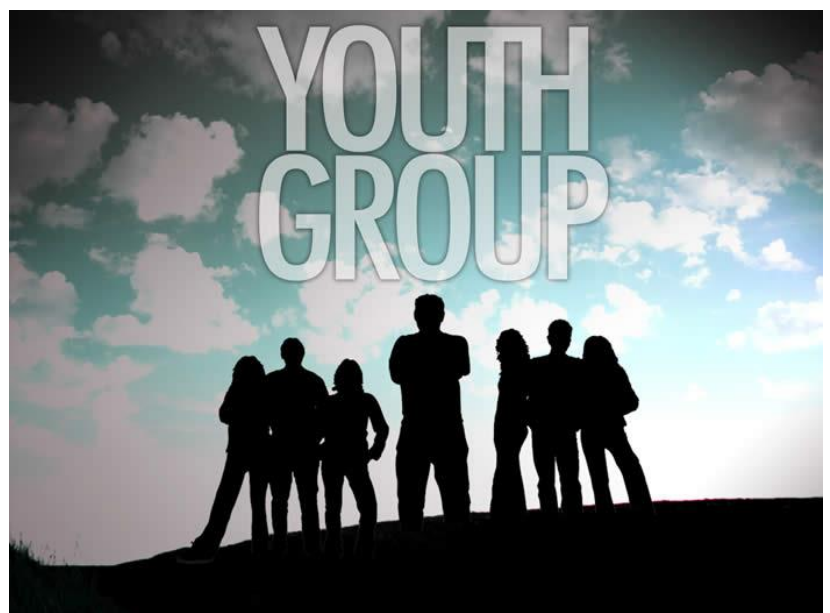
