

A MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER

Winter in Nature

As the days grow shorter and the nights longer and colder, we tend to go into a semblance of hibernation. In winter, like some trees shedding their leaves in preparation for a time of dormancy and other plants entering a grow slow phase, we tend to be less energetic and productive.

Although our walk with God and our faith journeys have ups and downs, we should guard against entering a faith winter. Antidotes against faith winters are regular study of the Bible, reflecting on



God's involvement in our lives and our community, worshipping with others, a faithful prayer life and uplifting fellowship. Who will join me in doing a thirteen-week Bible reading program? I plan to read Ruth, James and Deutero-Isaiah (chapters 40-55), following this schedule.

I might use the readings to preach on, and if there is enough interest, I will run a Bible study/reflection based on the readings every Wednesday morning, except the Wednesdays when the Midweek Winter Services take place.

Let's study the Bible together this winter!

There I met and in 1966, married Helen and together we have two daughters, Kristen who is lives here in Tauranga and Amanda who still



lives in Auckland. I have grown up surrounded by God's people and known the countless blessings that He has bestowed on me. Having come close to death after skiing off a cliff 43 years ago, quadruple heart bi-pass and quite a few more medical adventures, I have experienced the love and care of His angels through-out my life. I have served as an Elder in our last parish for over 40 years and been the Session Clerk there for six of them.

Having been at St Enoch's for only 17 months, I was a little surprised when Jim asked me if I would consider joining your Session. Now, after 30 months, having been appointed your Session Clerk leaves me somewhat speechless!

I am both humbled and honored to fulfill this role. I promise to carry out all that this position requires, relying on the strength and guidance our Lord gives me. You, the people of God here at St Enoch's, are His voice and so I also ask that you will help by keeping me informed of any thoughts or needs that arise in the congregation. Tribute to Barrie Herring

It was with sadness that we farewell our friend and fellow elder Barrie Herring.

Barrie served his Lord faithfully for many years having joined Session in 2007. But his contributions began long before this. During the time of Rev. Neal Whimp's ministry in 1989 Neal realized what hidden talents Barrie had, and so began a time of murals for the church. It is very fitting that the one that graced our sanctuary at his funeral was the crucifixion, one of the most important events in our history. But it was the resurrected Christ

who Barrie worshipped and followed.

Another mural painted by Barrie showed the connection between three Tauranga Presbyterian churches - St Peter's the mother church, St Enoch's the daughter and Welcome Bay the grandchild.

It is thanks to St Peter's that St Enoch's exist today, just as it was thanks to St Enoch's the Welcome Bay church came into being.

Barrie's faith and talents shone out from each and every mural.

Barrie took over the role of Presbytery elder from



Lois Rout and faithfully attended every meeting when he was well enough.

His regular attendance at Session meetings always amazed me, attending right up to not long before his death. Come rain or shine Barrie was there.

In 2004 he took over from Doris McCorkindale as editor of the Church magazine the Manawa. And it is thanks to Barrie that we now have such an interesting and relevant magazine today.

This was a mammoth job but being an avid reader meant he was well qualified for the job.

After collating the different articles, with the help of Cynthia they put it together, ready for delivery to church members.

Barrie and Cynthia were a team. So thank you Cynthia and Barrie's children for sharing such a wonderful person with this church.

We learnt many things about Barrie at his funeral.
He was very athletic which led on to him becoming a Physical Education teacher as well as Arts



teacher. He not only used his artistic talents for the church but also for shows at Baycourt painting backdrops. He even tried his hand at acting. Barrie and Cynthia shared many interests together - a love of theatre,

sequence dancing, classical music, folk dancing and Tai Chi. And a love for St Enoch's.

We will miss his smiling face and our condolences go out to Cynthia.





Symbolism of the windows


Red: Jesus Christ (Salvation)

Feedback - St. Enoch's Planning Day

Due to great engagement, a productive planning day held on 2nd March resulted in the emerging of five priorities for St. Enoch's. The planning day was followed up with a Session retreat on the 9th of March figuring out what can be done to grow these aspects of our church life. Here is a short overview of progress made so far.

- 1. Spiritual Growth: The Sunday School is going from strength to strength. The Tuesday Homegroup has grown to such an extent that they cannot accommodate any more people. Anel Reyneke started up the STEWW (St. Enoch's Working and studying Women) group as an opportunity for working women to do Bible study and connect. Ricky Gorringe is running a six-week study group, which has a waiting list. Between 8 and 10 people participate in a Spiritual Growth group held every 1st and 3rd Wednesday at 13:30 in the hall. Please consider whether you might be called to host a group and talk to Jaco about it. It is not as hard as you think.
- 2. Prayer Growth: Gail Walker actively runs an efficient prayer chain. People make use of the prayer ministry after the service. Prayer is the first topic the Spiritual Growth group is discussing in a very fruitful way. It would be fantastic to have a regular corporate prayer opportunity/prayer service. Would you like to run a monthly prayer group?
- 3. Expanded Fellowship: The Tuesday Roast Coffee Group (meeting at the Mitre 10 Café at 10:00) is a strong and healthy fellowship for men. 34 people enjoyed the autumn weather and colours of McLaren Falls Park and enjoyed a first-class picnic and friendly

fellowship, on the outing Chris and Chrissy Meyer organised. An excitingly successful Newcomers lunch helped people 'new' to



- St. Enoch's and the leadership to discover interesting facts about each other. Our Youth Group is gaining great momentum. Scheduled fellowship events for the rest of the year are: 'Soups of the World' (28 July), Spring Concert (7 September), Mature and Marvellous service (25 November)
- 4. Improved Outreach: Our Mission Motivator, Minette Soekoe, has refocussed our attention on and is building our relationship with the four organisations we currently support: Mission Aviation Fellowship; Homes of Hope; Wycliffe Bible Translators; Presbyterian Support Northern. Many people have reached out to friends and neighbours resulting in people coming to worship with us and join our journey of faith. To reach out to older people in our community and to serve our people better Midweek Winter Services are being planned for 11:00 on 12/6, 10/7 and 14/8. Except for a few people who are willing to pick people up for church, our Pay it Forward project, aiming to connect people's needs with people with the abilities and skills, has not yet taken off.
- 5. Worship: A big team of people continue to contribute to making Sunday worship as meaningful as possible for as many as possible of our faith family. Our congregation has a variety of spiritual and worship needs we are trying to meet.

It is impossible to mention everything happening.

We are a fantastic team, and it is inspirational to see how God is using people to add value to the Kingdom and others' lives.


